We are losing our pharmacy. The staff who have served us so well are losing their jobs.

Lloyd's Pharmacy has said that the Sainsbury's and other instore pharmacy concessions are not profitable, and they are apparently withdrawing from all instore pharmacies. There is a message up by the pharmacy saying that it will close in late April and suggesting our alternative is at Tesco. For many, the conditions, checking your medication at the counter Sainsbury's pharmacy is a lifeline. The area it serves is almost bafflingly large and it will be a huge loss for our community.

we are in difficulties. The pharmacy is a godsend for getting good advice for smaller problems. Indeed, a new government campaign is encouraging us to do just that. This decision will make that much harder.

Now, like many of us, I have been in the Oliver's Battery and Badger Farm area a very long time. The moment it is suggested that my alternatives involve negotiating either the one-way system or the M3, I start flinching and twitching. I can cope with either of those, but I know so many occasions when one might have needed something from a pharmacy and an accident or incident has made our lovely city impossible to traverse. For those reliant on public transport, the situation is even more difficult.

The next nearest pharmacy will be the Lloyd's by St Paul's Surgery. Parking is extremely limited and difficult there. Within the city, there are possibilities in Weeke, at Boots, Lloyd's and Boots again in the city centre or further out towards Tesco and King's Worthy. If one does not wish to go in or across Winchester (and who would drive Romsey

winter. The first early signs of Spring are starting to appear as I am writing this article.

Firstly, I would like to welcome Catherine Craven to the PC, I am sure she will be a great addition to our team.

We are planning to install some communication boards in the play areas, These are aimed at helping children on the Autistic spectrum but also are very interesting to everyone. They have been installed by some other local councils and have been very well received.

One cloud on our horizon is the proposed development on Bushfield Camp. In our opinion the early signs are that it will be totally overdeveloped and lead to serious access problems and possible additional vehicles parking on the estate. At this stage (early March) it appears that the consultation has been delayed and we will try to keep everybody informed when a definite date is announced.

The PC is in the process of reviewing our website and IT services and would welcome suggestions for inclusion on the new site.

You may not know that all the footpaths on Badger Farm are the responsibility of HCC. We have been asked by our County Councillor to highlight areas that require attention and send

This does not include overgrown hedges or trees that are generally the responsibility of Winchester City. Our footpaths are increasingly being used by bicycles and we would ask cyclists to give more consideration to pedestrians by keeping their speed down and giving them as much room as possible.

The unfortunate loss of the pharmacy at Sainsbury's is a major blow to the area especially to those that do not have a car. At the time of writing Sainsbury's are not sure what is going to happen but after talking to a manager in store it seems unlikely to be replaced. Hopefully there will be a satisfactory solution to this as alternate pharmacies are difficult to access, especially for our older residents.

WCC have assured us that the management of the green areas will be better this year than in the last two years. The contractors have new machinery that will collect the long grass and they have already given the kickabout areas the first cut. We will be proactively highlighting any missed cuts to the appropriate management in WCC.

Finally, our photographic competition will be held again later this year and details will be on our website and notice boards in due course.

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

Spending programme for 2023/24 Hampshire County Council's spending plans for 2023/24 include the £2.6bn annual budget and cover all the services delivered by the council for 1.4 million residents, including supporting our most vulnerable children and adults. Capital budget projects totaling £645.3m over the next three years include:

- £175m investment in new and extended school buildings to provide school places for children in Hampshire, delivering a further 4,393 school places and giving a total of 18,874 new school places by September 2025.
- £142m for structural maintenance and improvement of roads and bridges.
- £103m of Integrated Transport Plan schemes including £58m of schemes focused on walking and cycling improvements.
- An additional £0.3m funding towards the County Council's Flood Risk and Coastal Defence Programme as part of our response to the challenge of climate change.

20mph review A review of the criteria for 20mph speed limits on roads within Hampshire has been prepared following last year's public consultation. A report has been produced for the County Council's Cabinet recommending a series of changes which will make it easier for communities who want reduced speed limits to promote speed reduction schemes and seek the introduction of lower limits.

Large Scale Renewable Energy benefits dis-

Because of a partnership between the zoo and the neighbourhood council, the animals and tourists at Marwell Zoo are benefiting from renewable, clean energy. As part of its goal to going greener more quickly, Winchester City Council has invested in a sizable solar energy project in the Winchester neighbourhood. In 2021, the council installed 250 solar photovoltaic (PV) panels onto the rooftops of Marwell Zoo's buildings, with the generated power sold to the zoo at a discounted rate per kilowatt hour. The panels will last 20 years and generated 86,680 kWh per year in the first year of operation, reducing the annual carbon emissions by over 17 tonnes of CO2e per year, or 350 tonnes CO2e over the lifetime of the project.

New roadmap underpins council's commitment to be greener faster

A new roadmap commissioned by the council provides the evidence base and ranges of measures needed for the Winchester district to be carbon neutral by 2030. Since declaring a climate emergency in 2019, the city council has positioned the climate emergency as its overarching priority, ensuring that the climate emergency sits at the heart of its decisions and strategies. The Roadmap modelled 16 interventions covering: domestic, commercial, industrial, transRoads Bad weather in January provided some challenges for Hampshire Highways, especially from blocked drains, flooding and potholes. Even with improving weather and falling water tables, overnight freezing temperatures have exacerbated potholes with many appearing, particularly in rural areas. With demand high work is prioritised so that the highest risk issues are repaired first. This includes the use of temporary 'infill' repairs to major potholes, with these addressed on a longer-lasting basis later. One of the priorities now is to clear ditches to help alleviate surface water flooding. Please do continue to report highways issues online. Drain cover thefts Road users across Hampshire are being urged to be vigilant after a recent spate of drain cover thefts - leaving deep openings in the road surface which could cause a potential hazard to drivers, pedestrians and cyclists and also result in significant expense to council tax payers. Increased police numbers announced The Police and Crime Commissioner for Hampshire and Isle of Wight, Donna Jones, has presented her budget plan for 2023-24. She is on track to increase police numbers by an additional 600 officers by the end of March. Her new budget has added 50 more officers, funded by the police precept of council tax.

port, land use and waste. Critical to the success of achieving carbon neutrality by 2030 will be the contributions made not only by the council, but the County Council, the district's businesses and its residents - there is a role for everyone.

Voter Identification Requirements

The Elections Act 2022 was granted Royal Assent and passed into law on 28 April 2022. The new legislation includes changes to absent voting rules, EU citizens' voting rights, accessibility, voter identification and 'votes for life' for overseas electors. You can find out more about the Elections Act 2022 on www.gov.uk and on the Electoral Commission website electoralcommission.org.uk.

You are now required to show photographic identification at polling stations before you can be given a ballot paper. This will affect all voters across the district of Winchester who vote in person or by proxy at the next local election on Thursday 4 May 2023. If you choose to vote by proxy, then the person who you have trusted to vote on your behalf will have to take their own photographic identification to be issued a ballot paper. Postal voters will not be affected and will be issued with their postal ballot papers as usual.

Voters must bring a suitable form of photographic ID to their polling station. No suitable ID? You will need to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. It is free of charge to any eligible elector who applies for one. The deadline is 5pm Tuesday 25 April 2023. gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate

From your MP

We hear so much talk right now about the NHS – and strikes – and 'under-funding'. Truth is, the NHS in England has never had higher funding than it does right now yet still we see north of seven million people on the waiting list (many of them courtesy of the Covid backlog), cancer outcomes lagging behind our competitors and GP surgeries, not to mention hospitals, literally creaking under the strain. I will also support our local NHS – and deplore at-

tempts to talk down the RHCH for partisan gain – but we're serving no-one if we don't face the pressures on the system and take the long view of their origins and solution.

The challenges are, of course, complex and long-standing but I have welcomed recovery plans for clearing waiting lists, urgent and emergency care and primary care. They deserve serious scrutiny and that's my job but they won't be enough on their own.

What's plain to see from the hard facts before us is that demand is outstripping supply in the NHS by a significant margin. We can go on increasing the budget – pushing up taxes to ensure NHS spending keeps rising faster than GDP – and filling those many vacancies across the service but that's not sustainable by simple logic.

I don't pretend the Health & Social Select Committee (which I chair) has the answers, but I do hope we're onto something with our major new inquiry looking comprehensively at the prevention of ill-health as a path towards a healthier nation and a sustainable NHS that's there for another 75 years.

For the first stage of this inquiry, we want to hear from researchers, organisations and individuals interested in or working in preventative healthcare. This is your opportunity

to get involved and suggest what specific issues we should be exploring. We've had so many suggestions around 'upstream prevention' including genomic sequencing, obesity and physical activity, smoking and alcohol use but also a pitch to look at the increasing evidence around how poor air quality can drive heart disease, respiratory illness and even cancer.

I am also keen that we look at the untapped potential that still exists around vaccination – and there's so much coming online in that regard –

and wider non-NHS issues such as how poor quality housing is a driver of illness. It's going to be a major workstream and we hope we can really move the dial with our work. You can get involved by going to stevebrine.com/prioritynhs.

Finally, on a not unrelated subject given the public health angle, constituents don't need reminding that we've had a bad run in this area with Southern Water and their water supply works at Otterbourne. Big gaps in water supply before Christmas – unacceptably repeated of course during February half-term – left many of us fuming. At the first opportunity I combined with neighbouring MPs to haul the bosses of Southern Water to Westminster to explain themselves and set out exactly what happened and how they're going to invest OUR MONEY to drastically reduce the likelihood of a repeat. And I visited Otterbourne to better inform myself on the subject. I will, as ever, do my best to update constituents via my website (stevebrine.com) and local media but do get in touch if you wish to engage.

Ready, Set, VOTE!

We are avowedly apolitical in the Community Centre and magazine but there is a change coming in this year that will affect all of us who are eligible to vote and, as we host the Polling Station, it seems right to make sure you are fully informed.

Rules for in-person and proxy votes

For the first time, you will need to provide photo identification in order to vote in person or by proxy. Your Poll Card will not be sufficient and the Polling Clerks will not be allowed to give you a ballot paper. It is relatively simple for those of us who drive and/or travel as a photocard Driving Licence or a passport are fine as forms of identification. For those that don't, here is the list from the Government's website (gov.uk/how-to-vote/photo-id-youll-need) of all the accepted photo ID:

- a UK or Northern Ireland photocard driving licence (full or provisional)
- a driving licence issued by the EU, Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands
- a UK passport
- a passport issued by the EU, Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein or a Commonwealth country
- a PASS card (National Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- a Blue Badge
- a biometric residence permit (BRP)
- a Defence Identity Card (MOD form 90)
- a national identity card issued by the EU, Norway, Iceland or Liechtenstein
- a Northern Ireland Electoral Identity Card
- a Voter Authority Certificate
- an Anonymous Elector's Document

You can also use one of the following travel passes as photo ID when you vote:

- an older person's bus pass
- a disabled person's bus pass
- an Oyster 60+ card
- a Freedom Pass

If you can tick-off at least one item from this list, then take it to the Polling Station as your proof of identity. You can use your ID even if it has expired as long as the photo on it still looks like you.

Now, the important part. It is entirely possible that you or someone you know does not have something from the list. If that's the case, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate from gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate, You will need a recent, digital photo of yourself and your National Insurance number. You can still apply if you do not have a National Insurance number but you'll need to provide other documents to prove your identity, for example a birth certificate, bank statement and utility bill. If you apply as soon as you read this article, you should have your certificate in good time. The application deadline is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April.

Rules for postal votes

The rules for postal votes have not changed: you do not need to provide ID to apply for, or to complete, a postal vote as there are other identification checks, including verification of your signature and date of birth. You don't have to have a reason to apply for a postal vote: you can choose to vote by post simply because it would be more convenient for you. If you are already registered to vote by post, you don't need to register again. To apply to vote by post you need to download, print and fill in the postal vote application form from electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/apply-vote-post. The deadline for applications is 5pm on Tuesday 18 April.

We are sad to report the death of a member of our community. She was someone that many of us knew from teaching our children (or grandchildren – as she would remind us) and a person who served the Oliver's Battery and Badger Farm communities for thirty-nine years.

Catherine Pybus - or 'Miss Pybus' to most who would have

known her – was a dedicated and committed teacher. She began her career a few years before coming to Oliver's Battery Primary School and served there until she retired.

children flourished and under her leadership of English, children had access to the very best books, resources and teaching available.

Catherine retired some years ago now and so is unlikely to be known at the school, but we who worked with her or were taught by her just wanted to take a moment in your reading to remember someone who served our community for many, many years.

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

Avoid those big household bills

I started TALLTIM Property Service several years ago. In that time, I've undertaken well over 1,000 jobs on residents' homes in my local community. It's always struck me that if early preventative action was taken for certain jobs then damage could have been avoided, saving time, money and homeowners' stress. I would like to share just a few of the most common things that every homeowner can be aware of to avoid bigger costs further down the line.

- 1. Failing to have effective silicon sealant around baths, shower trays, sinks, kitchen work tops leads to damp patches on the ceilings of rooms below bathrooms, collapsed sections of ceilings or ruined worktops.
- 2. Missing or loose mortar between external bricks (pointing) allows damp to get into internal walls, resulting in damp patches and collapsing plaster.
- 3. Missing or loose grouting between tiles in showers is a major cause of tiles coming away from the shower wall and damp on ceilings in the rooms below.
- 4. Leaking gutters or overspill from gutters usually the result of debris in gutters or blocked downpipes causing excessive rain water to run down walls can cause black mould on exterior walls to build up. This is unsightly and increases the risk of water working its way through walls giving damp patches on interior walls.

- 5. Failure to repair one or two leaning or snapped fence posts may result in the whole fence collapsing in even mild windy weather. Repairing one or two posts can cost ten times less than a new fence. It's unlikely that your household insurance policy will cover damage to fences caused by adverse weather.
- 6. Failing to regularly paint or stain fences, decking and sheds. Regular maintenance can add years to the life of any external wooden structure provided it's done properly.
- 6. No surprise with this one and currently very topical. Make sure you have adequate insulation in lofts, including on the loft door itself. This is an easy fix and will save huge amounts on your utility bills.

There are reputable tradespeople in your area who can assist and advise you with all these things to help save you money in the longer run. Do ensure you take references and don't accept any cold callers at your door offering property services. Unless you know the tradesperson well or they've been recommended by people you trust, think hard before paying any up-front deposits. If you have any doubts about a tradesperson just don't use them as it's better to be safe than sorry.

I really hope this has been helpful and I am always here to help should you require it.



Wildlife Gardening

I think the frogs have finished – at least, there's less noise from the pond; I got buzzed by a very early bee and the sounds coming from the copse on Whiteshute Ridge are gloriously deafening. If you have the time to sit, listen and watch, the signs of the end of Winter are bombarding us and by the time you read this – it will be Spring.

For me, it's a planning time. You may have gathered that I am no expert and that what I have done has been a process of trial and error. The one thing I have learned and apply all the time is that if I plan for attracting wildlife and supporting it then wildlife comes. The pond was key to the plan.

I started on the pond in 2018 with a sunken half-barrel that I got from a local DIY shop. In the height of the Summer, I dug a hole in the sunniest part of the garden (I can't remember why I chose that spot – probably no fruit bushes right there!) and sunk the barrel. I filled the bottom with pebbles, made sure there was a slope up and out for frogs and any stray hedgehogs that fell in, obtained some oxygenating plants from Southern Waterscapes in Romsey and then filled it with water. Within days we had at least one frog. I will never have a clue where it came from as I don't know of any other ponds or water sources nearby.

The following February, this frog started his (yes, it is male frogs that over-winter in the ponds) mating call and the rest

is best left unsaid. Whilst 2020 was a terrible year for all of us, it was different for frog spawn and we were inundated. This year is the same. We built it, they came. I've written before about the reduction in slugs and snails in the garden; the frogs predate the pests.

I plan around the pond. For instance, I have investigated pollinator friendly plants to put in around the pond, particularly ones that will provide some shade when it's most needed. I am an enthusiastic advocate of 'No Mow May' but I continue that until I am sure there are no froglets still harbouring in the lawn. This year, I am using the late prunings from buddleia and other shrubs to create log piles around the perimeter of the garden; these will provide overwintering shelter for female frogs as well as other creatures I want to encourage. It will be a triumph when I know the garden is home to at least one stag beetle.

I'm actually planning towards next Spring now. I am taking photographs of all the places in the garden where I think a crocus or daffodil is necessary, where a hellebore will provide for an early pollinator, where the feeders for the birds should go. In the meantime, I am off to read what the RHS and BBC Gardeners' World are saying about cottage gardens and ear-marking the flowers that grow well in chalk. Let's hope my trowel survives – oh yes, I broke two last year....

The special plant properties of polyphenols have been highlighted previously in blackberries around our beloved Bushfield, and these special zesty compounds are also found in your tasty, fresh, real, whole fruit and vegetables, nuts and seeds, herbs and spices.

In the face of rising prices, the need to grow our own has never been greater. As many of us don't have an allotment or large gardens though, vibrant herbs still seem easy to grow in pots outside or on sunny windowsills inside. This means that we can easily add these lively, delicious, nutritious, health- and nature-friendly little powerhouses to our meals, smoothies, soups, sauces and stews at very low cost. I also like to make concentrated pesto out of fresh spare leaves – just chop up finely and add to extra virgin olive oil, mix in your favourite peppery spices, garlic or balsamic vinegar and add to salads, wholegrain crispbreads, baked sweet potatoes, etc.

These energetic easy-grow herbs are nature-friendly too as pointed out by The Soil Association (soilassociation.org) as bees love bronze fennel, chives, garlic, basil, camomile, lemon balm and mint. If you are wondering how to grow your own, see the Soil Association's article on the Top 5 Best Beefriendly flowers & herbs (bit.ly/3Jb3YT6) which can be grown in borders, pots or on sunny windowsills or simply buy them ready-potted, and ideally organic, from supermarkets or plant centres.

For even greater no/low costs, there's also a really clear video on How to grow herbs from cuttings (bit.ly/3KRMtsg) with rosemary. I've got a lovely lavender grown from a cutting kindly given to me by a green-fingered neighbour.

Finally to cheeky garlic, a key, pulsating vegetable in many healthy ways and one of the easiest to grow at home too. With love, sun and good soil in the garden or in a pot, each clove of garlic will normally grow into a head of garlic to harvest a few months later. Find out everything you need to know on How To Grow Garlic from BBC Gardeners' World (gardenersworld.com/how-to/grow-plants/how-to-grow-garlic); the instructions can be summed up as: plant cloves about 5cm deep in the autumn/winter, let them get cold over the winter (low temperatures are required to trigger growth), keep them moist in the spring/summer in a sunny position, keenly watch them grow and harvest in July/August. As Gardeners' Word say 'It's easy to think of garlic as a Mediterranean plant and therefore a tender crop that needs lots of warmth to grow well. However, if you choose a good variety and give it the right conditions, you can produce a decent crop no matter where you live in the UK.

Tech Talk

Having been nagged by my PC for almost a year, I've finally updated to Windows 11. The process was simple: I clicked the Download and Install button and then followed the onscreen instructions.



If you don't get that prompt, go to Settings then Update & Security and you may see a Windows 11 update option. If you don't, it's likely that your computer can't run Windows 11 due to the strict hardware requirements. The good news is that Microsoft will support Windows 10 until October 2025 which gives you plenty of time to buy new hardware.

Windows 11 has a subtle new look and feel. Windows have rounded edges, icons are simpler, colours are gentler and sounds are softer. Some areas, though, still have the legacy look which is a little jarring.

The most obvious difference between Windows 10 and 11 is that the Start menu and taskbar are now in the centre. I find the redesigned Start menu much more useful. It's divided into two areas: Pinned apps – which can now be grouped, as in Android, so I can access them more quickly and no longer have to cram them into my taskbar – and Recommended which shows recently accessed documents. The distracting Live Tiles have been removed from Start, replaced by a separate new Widgets icon.

There are new ways to manage the layout of your windows. Snap Layouts, accessed by hovering over the Maximise button at the top of any window, make it easy to arrange two or more open apps neatly on your desktop. If that's not enough, you can have multiple desktops that create different virtual spaces to separate your work and personal areas.

Windows Settings have been updated: the dashboard has gone, replaced by a list view. There are new options to play with but if you were happy with your Windows 10 settings you'll find you won't need to change much, if anything. The File Explorer has had a cosmetic makeover and also now supports tabs. I gather (per bit.ly/3SqSxX2) that it's getting a big update with more new features later in the year.

I've often said that Windows and Android 'play nicely together'. Windows 11 takes this further by running Android apps on your desktop. It's a bit tricky to set up (there's an easy-tofollow guide on bit.ly/3KrQSCO) and only supports apps from Amazon, which has far less choice than Google Play. It has potential but it's not something I see myself using much.

If the changes I've described leave you feeling a bit unconvinced about upgrading, you might consider the improvements to performance and security it brings, detailed in PCMag's Windows 11: Biggest Changes and New Features (bit.ly/3SjhPtz). All-in-all, while there are differences with Windows 10, I would concur with PCMag that 'Most of the work on Windows 11 went toward redesigning the interface rather than building wholly new features, so the OS is more familiar than you may expect' (bit.ly/3SlKaQ7).

Nature Notes

Amulets and Ravens

Several years ago I was handed a small dome-shaped 'rock' with a flat bottom and an attractive five-pointed star radiating out from the top. It had been discovered in Texas Field after the farmer had been ploughing. The 'stone' turned out to be a fossilized sea urchin which would have lived millions of years ago in the Cretaceous period, when much of the south of England was covered by warm tropical seas. The fossils are also known as Thunder Stones. They were used as an amulet to ward off evil and superstitions grew up around them. One was that Thor the God of Thunder threw the 'stones' to earth which led to some people believing that by placing them on the window sill or by the door, the house would be protected from lightening strikes and any evil and malevolent spirits. Another superstition was to keep them in the dairy to stop the milk from going sour and another for bakers to place them near the oven to help the bread rise.

Maybe this is how they came to be known as Fairy Loaves by children. They were also reported to be highly prized by witches and ancient graves have been found with them scattered alongside bones.
